1. **uncountable** the act of living in a place
  - They looked around for any signs of habitation.
  - The houses were **unfit for human habitation** (= not clean or safe enough for people to live in) .
2. **countable** (*formal*) a place where people live
  - The road serves the scattered habitations along the coast.
